My research involved studying the neural mechanisms and circuitry underlying pain modulation and the crucial role of the central amygdala and zona incerta. My research won the Outstanding Poster Award at the 2022 NIH Postbac Poster Day. I presented my work at the 2022 USASP Annual Scientific Meeting that was held in Cincinnati, Ohio from May 18-21. In addition, I recently received the "Intramural Scientific Achievement Merit Award: For exceptional contributions toward the identification of a novel pain pathway from the central amygdala to the zona incerta." Lastly, I also received the 2022 NCCIH Annual Director's Mentoring Award: To recognize my work as a mentor through the Summer Internship Program.

#### **Overview**

Since 1993, The MAYDAY Fund has supported innovative projects to close the gap between knowledge and practice in the treatment of pain, as well projects to build on the current knowledge base. Understanding that creating meaningful change with modest funding is a challenge, MAYDAY tends to provide significant support to a handful of projects annually. Starting in 2023, The MAYDAY Fund has awarded the United States Association for the Study of Pain funding for 3 years to support two meritorious early career investigators who propose innovative clinical/translational research in the field of pain.

#### **Research Topics**

Competitive research proposals address clinical/ translational research related to the management of pain. Applicants should describe the proposed research in pain and describe how it is innovative and cutting edge. In addition, the applicant should describe their vision for a career in pain research and provide information or any examples of leadership in pain-related activities.

#### **Key Dates and Deadlines**

<u>The application portal will open March 1, 2023</u>

Deadline for completed applications is 11:59 PM (eastern) on March 30, 2023

Grant awards will begin July 1, 2023

#### Eligibility

To be eligible for the USASP-MAYDAY Clinical/Translational Research Award, the applicant: Must be a USASP member

Early career Assistant Professors within four years of the appointment are eligible to apply,

except those who have received tenure at the time of the application.

Must conduct their research and be appointed at an institution in the United States or Canada. Should demonstrate a commitment to the field of pain research.

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


## BOOK CORNER

A Review of

Chasing The Scream: The first and last days of the war on drugs



## by Johann Hari

"The opposite of addiction is connection."
This is the thesis of this superb book on addiction and its criminalization in the United States.

Hari writes beautifully and draws the reader into the plight of the opioid users whom he describes in the first half of this book. The vignettes of those who suffer from this plague reduced me to tears. So many were started on this disastrous path by appropriately prescribed opioids for pain relief, but never could stop their drug consumption. Then, the American criminalization of opioid consumption locked them into illegal drugs and their distribution, frequently sending them to jail for a crime that hurts only themselves.

### What a sad story!

Hari pursues the dealers and their supply chains. The brutal cruelty of the drug business is described; neighborhoods are turned into battle zones. Like any war, the uninvolved locals are the real victims of the battles. We then learn about Harry Anslinger, who marshalled the forces of the United States government to criminalize drug possession, sales and use as a cover for his prejudices against Chinese and Blacks. He carried this campaign beyond the United States to the rest of the world, with far too many success stories for the banning of opioids and criminalization of their possession and sales. All that was missing was any evidence that turning drug possession into a crime reduced the use of drugs. It certainly filled the prisons in our country with people who were now unemployable and had to turn to drug dealing to make a living.

Next Hari gives us a glimpse of some of the heroes who have attempted to serve the needs of the addicted. From these portraits he develops the theme that addiction is characterized and promulgated by the loss of interpersonal connections. This being the starting point, it is not hard to realize that locking people up in jail cells further constrains their connections to other people and therefore increases the likelihood

of remaining addicted and outside of one's culture. The last section of the book advocates for the abolition of penalties for drug use of possession and accepting those who are addicted as being ill and needing both health care and interpersonal connections; hereby reversing one hundred years of a bad decision. Criminalization perpetuates addiction and creates the illegal drug business.

Pain physicians need to be aware of the bases for addiction and should take action to mitigate this risk. It is time for us to reverse our policies about opioid drugs and provide useful care to those who have fallen into this abyss. This book will start the reader on such a course.
